The lucky 100 people who purchase tickets for this event will become the "passengers" on Flight 1234 of Blue Sky Airlines. After an emergency landing in the middle of the worst blizzard to hit the South Dakota borders, the passengers are stuck in the airport hangar and do their best to ride out the storm. From the moment the 100 passengers

enter the hangar, they are faced with many strange things and people.

Come join the fun at this VCCT fundraising event. The murder mystery dinner will raise money toward our effort to renovate the old Lincoln elementary school into a legitimate theatre and permanent home for VCCT. VCCT to Renovate Old Lincoln School for New Home

Thanks to a generous donation by Rick & Doris Kennay, VCCT has acquired the old Lincoln School building in Rochelle. The group has already begun the long and expensive process of

converting in to its new home! Architect Renee VanDerHeyden presented a preliminary design

with extensive input from the VCCT board. The old gymnasium will be converted into the main theatre with seating for 100 to 150 patrons, a full stage, and a state-of-the-art lightbooth. A large classroom at the front of the old school will serve as the lobby, while two other classrooms on the first floor will be converted into a "green room" and a kitchen/ utility room. The remainder of the building will be used for costumes, props, building materials, workshops,

and other essential theater functions. Volunteers

have spent countless hours already working on the new space. New LED lights have replaced old and inefficient outdoor lighting and security cameras have been installed. Windows have been replaced

and moldy tiles have been removed. Nonfunctioning plumbing was taken out and some temporary



walls have come down. The next phases, which include installing heating and air conditioning and new bathrooms, requires permits, survey work, and capital. VCCT has begun a capital

> fundraising campaign to raise the money necessary to continue the project. More details about how vou can contribute can be found on the website:

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Own a Piece of Lincoln

As part of the remodeling of the old Lincoln elementary school into a new and permanent theater home, VCCT has commissioned several memorial wood decoration pieces that you can get when you make a \$10 donation to VCCT's building fund. These can be used as wall hangings, coasters, or tree ornaments. Each one was made

from one of the old oak trees on the grounds of the old school that had to be taken down, or from one of the playground posts that are being removed from the lot. Stenciled onto the larger items are the words "Lincoln School 1909" to commemorate when the school was first erected. The wood decorations come in three diameters: 2 inch, 4 inch, or 6 inch and are available for just a donation of \$10 each. Your tax deductible donation will be used to help renovate the school. VCCT Hosts Fundraising Events

In an effort to raise funds for the remodeling of the old Lincoln School, VCCT hosted several fundraising events this year. In October, loyal patrons swarmed the Culver's in Rochelle. For one evening only, a percentage of all sales were donated to VCCT. The organization raised over \$500 for that event. A similar event was held at the Portillo's in Sycamore in November. When anyone showed the cashier the flyer or identified themselves as a VCCT supporter, 20% of their purchase price was donated to the club. Finally, on December 1, VCCT held its first Holiday Gala and Silent Auction dinner at Salt 251 in Rochelle. More than \$4000 was raised at that event. More events are planned for 2019.
